Northern Virginia Chamber celebrates Black American resilience and contributions ahead of Juneteenth

Leadership raises awareness of Juneteenth

Tysons Corner, Va. – This week the Northern Virginia Chamber of Commerce (Northern Virginia Chamber) commemorates the 156th anniversary of Juneteenth, a celebration of the freedom Black Americans gained following slavery and of Black American life and resilience and honoring the contributions of Black Americans to our country. Juneteenth reminds us that real change, though often frustrating and painful, is possible.

"The battle towards racial equality continues and Juneteenth is an important moment in time when we celebrate the resilience and contributions of Black Americans," said Kathryn Falk, Northern Virginia Chamber Board of Directors Chair. "We also take the day to support Black businesses and leaders in the region as a way to reaffirm our values with our actions."

The Northern Virginia Chamber has a long-standing commitment to ensuring the organization reflects the diversity of the region and advocates for an inclusive business climate that creates equitable access for all to thrive. Last year, the organization formed a Diversity Equity & Inclusion (DE&I) Board of Advisors that put the organization's values into impactful and swift action. The Board of Advisors reports to the Executive Committee which has operationalized DE&I as a core business priority during each meeting. In June 2020, the Northern Virginia Chamber reaffirmed this commitment by condemning systemic racism and expressing support for its community in a statement reaffirming the organization's values.

"Even though it's been 156 years since Union troops arrived in Galveston, Texas declaring the abolition of slavery, Black Americans continue to face racial discrimination and inequality," said John A.

"On this Juneteenth, we urge business leaders in our region to reflect and reaffirm commitments to lasting change and support the resilience and strength of Black businesses and leaders."
